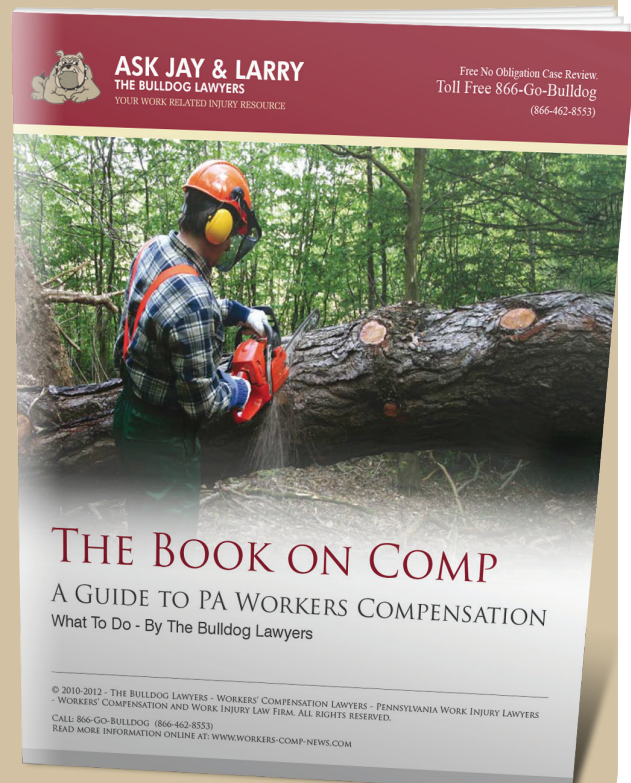

Recipe: Mojito Slushy



Being that this is the August issue, it is only appropriate that this month's recipe be that of a delicious, refreshing, frozen drink. This is a summer favorite, quick and easy to make and may even inspire you to grow your own mint at home.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup water
- ½ cup fresh lime juice, about 4-6 limes
- ¼ fresh mint leaves
- 2 limes, zested
- ½ cup light rum
- 8 cups crushed ice
- Mint sprigs and lime wedges for garnish

DIRECTIONS:

- 1 In a saucepan over medium heat, add the sugar and water.
- 2 Cook for about 5 minutes, stirring often, until the sugar is dissolved and the syrup is clear. Set aside to cool.
- 3 Put the sugar syrup, lime juice, mint leaves, lime zest, and rum into a blender and blend until smooth. Add the ice and blend until slushy.
- 4 Spoon into glasses, garnish with a sprig of mint and a lime slice.

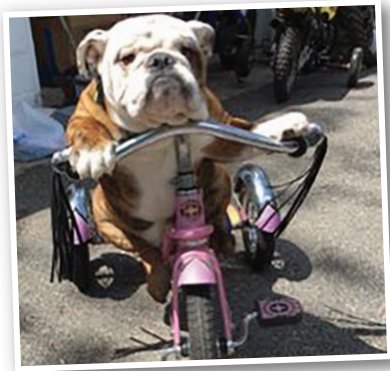
